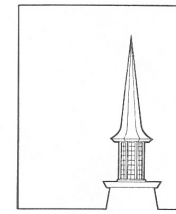
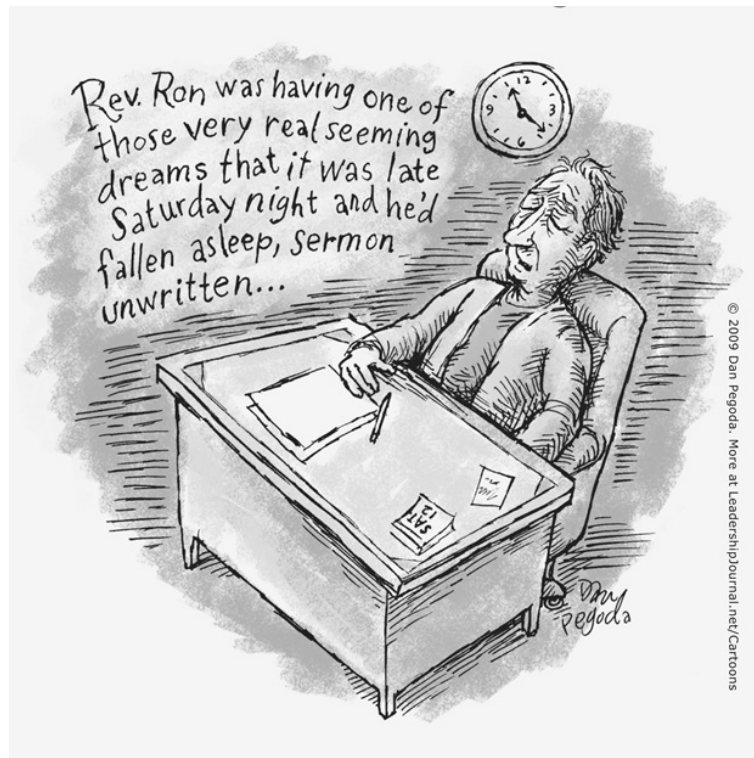



CATHY CHAPMAN RECEIVES AWARD

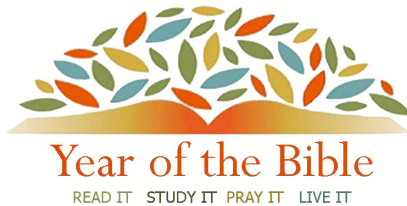
Cathy Chapman was recently presented with an award from the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners for excellence in clinical practice in the state of Maryland.

12 MOST FORMATIVE SCRIPTURES

Terry Shue, director of leadership development for Mennonite Church USA, writes: “At the Pittsburgh convention, delegates affirmed adopting several new priorities for our denomination, one being Christian Formation.



The priority reads:

This first and highest priority commits us to fashion and mold our lives after that of Jesus Christ. As the sent One of God, Jesus sends us into the world. As missional communities, our congregations, conferences, And agencies will ensure that people are invited to make a commitment to Christ, disciplined in the way of Christ, taught to engage with the Scriptures, helped to develop Christian identity from an Anabaptist/Mennonite perspective, and given the capacity to cultivate their vocational calling. (Matthew 28:18-20, Romans 8:28-30, Colossians 1:28-29, 2 Timothy 1:5; Articles 17 and 18, Confession of Faith in a Mennonite Perspective)

Following our gathering at Pittsburgh, It was clear that churches desired to give more emphasis to this priority. I convened a group of persons with great passion for the Bible to help me dream about ways to use the Bible more significantly in congregational life. I called this ad hoc group the “Bible Dream Team.”

Of the many ideas generated by this team, one rose to the top. We desire to inspire each congregation to engage in a process that would identify the 12 most important Scripture texts or stories for their congregation, answering the question, “Why that one?” These Scriptures would not come from the top down—not from the denomination, area conferences or even congregational leadership—but from the grassroots up.

CELEBRATE PEACE SUNDAY SEPTEMBER 21

Along with Mennonite World Conference, Mennonite Church USA celebrates Peace Sunday the Sunday closes to the International Day of Prayer for Peace, which is September 21. Our service on that Sunday will focus on “Praying for the peace of Jerusalem.”



In many ways, Jerusalem is a microcosm of our world. It is ancient, beautiful, and teeming with life. And it continues to be torn apart by violence and enmity, fueled by injustice, mistrust, and often—tragically—the misuse of sacred Scripture.

Jerusalem is a holy city to not just one but three of the world’s religions: Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. All three claim Jerusalem as a place of reverence and worship. All three share Abraham as a common ancestor and “father of their faith.” That they cannot share Jerusalem is the epitome of human fallenness and spiritual brokenness. It is the antithesis of Psalm 133:

How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity! It is like the precious oil on the head, running down upon the beard, on the beard of Aaron, running down over the collar of his robes. It is like the dew of Hermon, which falls on the mountains of Zion. For there the Lord ordained his blessing, life forevermore.

It is no wonder that Jesus wept when he looked down upon the city (Luke 19:41-42). So shall we weep. And so shall we pray for the peace of Jerusalem (Psalm 122:6).
